It has been an exciting year at Leadership York. As our Executive Director, Wilda, noted last summer, "this will be a year to reset."

Reset. I had visions of my vacuum cleaner catching one of my dog's pull toys and shutting off. After yanking out the toy, I search for the reset button. Once found and pressed, we are back in business. Will I do anything different next time - move all the toys to a safe space before hitting the

'on' button? Or leave them scattered and hope for the best?

After three years of staying the course, a reset for Leadership York means building upon the successes of the past to create momentum for the future. Our reset is an opportunity to try new and different strategies to advance our mission of training, connecting, and inspiring individuals in hopes of serving the York community in leadership positions. Here is how we plan to achieve this:

#### Provide programming that is responsive to the changing needs of our community

Updates to existing programs that cover a range of topics on poverty, DEI 101, the arts, and small group tours. A new program, All on Board, for volunteers and nonprofit leaders as a refresher for board roles and responsibilities, which just had its inaugural classes in January and February.

#### Maximize resources

Noting that Leadership York was building a healthy cash reserve, the Board approved the launch of the "Leaders Create Legacies" endowment campaign in mid-2023 with a \$1.2 million goal. This will ensure sustainability and expansion of our programs well into the future.

#### **Build and sustain community leaders**

This fall we will celebrate the 45th anniversary of Leadership York. More than 4,300 have graduated from our programs and are making a difference in their communities.

Building our endowment will ensure that thousands of new leaders will shape our community to be the best place to live, work and play.

Wilda was right – this is a year to reset. As Leadership York resets, I encourage each of you to think about your leadership journey. I hope that it will include a strong relationship with Leadership York through programs, events, charitable giving, and volunteerism. Leaders create legacies. Legacies ensure a vibrant future for our communities. What will your reset look like?

2019 ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR

Delma Rivera-Lytle (LTP 82, LDS 09, AOY 19) is not only an alumnus of Leadership York, but a true champion of the mission.

Upon graduating from college, Delma knew she wanted to get involved in the York community and was looking for organizations with the resources to help her. She shared that, "when you see people that you respect involved in something, you tend to look at it more closely." Witnessing the passion exuded by her own mother who served on the very first Leadership York Board of Directors is what led Delma to explore the organization for herself and enroll in the Leadership Training Program to help connect her to the community.

When her career path took her into diversity work at Central York School District years later, she enrolled in another Leadership York program, Leadership for Diverse Schools. Her a-ha moment at the LDS graduation was being able to have her mother there as her guest to witness not only her graduation, but also how the organization had grown since its inception.

Delma is big on "being a connector" and feels as though Leadership York exemplifies that role. She explained that "through the Leadership York programs, you do not superficially meet people, you get to know them. It's networking but it's also developing friendships, not just making connections but making personal connections."

When she's not fulfilling duties as the current Ms. Pennsylvania Senior America or tackling renovation projects in their home in Puerto Rico, Delma can be found attending events or volunteering for one of the many local nonprofits she supports. When asked why she continues to stay involved with Leadership York, she shared, "It's the legacy. When an organization has given a lot to you and your family, naturally you want to give back to them. When I see what Leadership York has done for the community, I want to support that!"

## **Leadership Training Program**

In this nine-month experiential course, participants learn about York County, get more involved in the community, and begin to make a difference right away. LTP sessions provide an insider's view of York, its people, and its issues. Community leaders and leading subject matter experts conduct the sessions covering topics such as human services, the economy, education, law and justice, understanding diversity, government, and health care.

### Outstanding Alumnus of the Year

Jenny Englerth (EC 05, NLA 06) is the President/CEO of Family First Health. She has served as the founding board chair for the PA Coalition on Oral Health and more recently was the founding Board Chair of the White Rose Leadership Institute where she continues to serve on the board today. She is also the Chair of the Healthy York Coalition, serves on the board for York Suburban Education Foundation, and is the Pennsylvania representative for OPEN (Oral Health Progress and Equity Network).



#### **Outstanding Partner of the Year**

In 2021 the Manufacturers' Association opened the Regional Center of Excellence for Apprenticeship and Training — a facility to combat the skills gap in manufacturing. As a result, the Association now operates the largest manufacturing apprenticeship in the region, trains and reskills nearly 3,000 manufacturing workers annually and builds the future workforce through its pre-apprenticeship and career programs.
